



Dear Saints of Spring Hill,

This feels like an important season of discernment. There is energy here. There is new life. There is a growing sense that God is inviting us into deeper discipleship and renewed purpose. But following Christ has always required more than recognizing God's presence; it asks us to imagine what might be possible and trust enough to step forward.

This summer, our staff and committees will begin important work together. During a staff planning retreat in June, we will start shaping ministry plans and building a calendar for the coming August-to-August year. Committees have been invited to reflect on a central question:

How does your work connect to God's call for this church and contribute to a shared vision?

- What kind of church is God calling us to become?
- What unique witness do we offer to Mobile?
- How do our ministries help people grow as disciples?
- Where do we experience joy in serving God and one another?

Later this summer, our officers will gather to continue this work, bringing together committee reflections, ministry priorities, and hopes for the future into a clearer vision for where God may be leading us.

And this is where you come in. The future of Spring Hill is not created by staff, officers, or committees alone. It is shaped by the prayers, hopes, gifts, and participation of the whole congregation. So I invite you to wonder with us:

What do you hope for this church?

What ministries have shaped your faith?

What needs do you see in our community?

How is God calling you to participate?

Spring Hill is ready to move forward, deepen our discipleship, and continue becoming a church that reflects God's love in meaningful ways. The question before us is not whether God is calling, but whether we are listening and willing to respond.

This summer will also take me beyond our congregation for a season. I am grateful to have been elected by the Presbytery of South Alabama to serve as a commissioner to the 227th General Assembly of the PC(U.S.A.), where I will serve on the Committee for Constitutional Interpretation. Committee work will begin online in late June, followed by participation in plenary sessions in Milwaukee through early July.

Before that, I'll have the privilege of attending the Senior High Montreat Youth Conference, one of the most meaningful experiences in the life of many Presbyterian youth. I look forward to sharing in that time of worship, learning, and community.

Because of these commitments, I will be out of the pulpit from June 28 through July 19, and I am deeply grateful that Rev. Eugenia Gamble will be with us in worship during that time. I know she will bring wisdom, grace, and a fresh voice to our congregation.

As we move into summer, my prayer is this:

May we continue to pay attention to where Christ is present.

May we trust God enough to imagine new possibilities.

And may we rediscover the joy that comes from serving God and one another with open hearts.

The road continues before us.

Let's keep walking together.

But through his meteoric rise as a sought after concert artist, he always said, "Absolutely!" when I called him to return to Georgia where he played for us three times. When I was getting ready to move to Mobile, he was quick to ask when he could come visit, and my friends, the time is here!

David will be performing on the Hutchinson Organ in the Fellowship Hall on Sunday, June 14 at 2 PM and then we will have an ice cream social following.

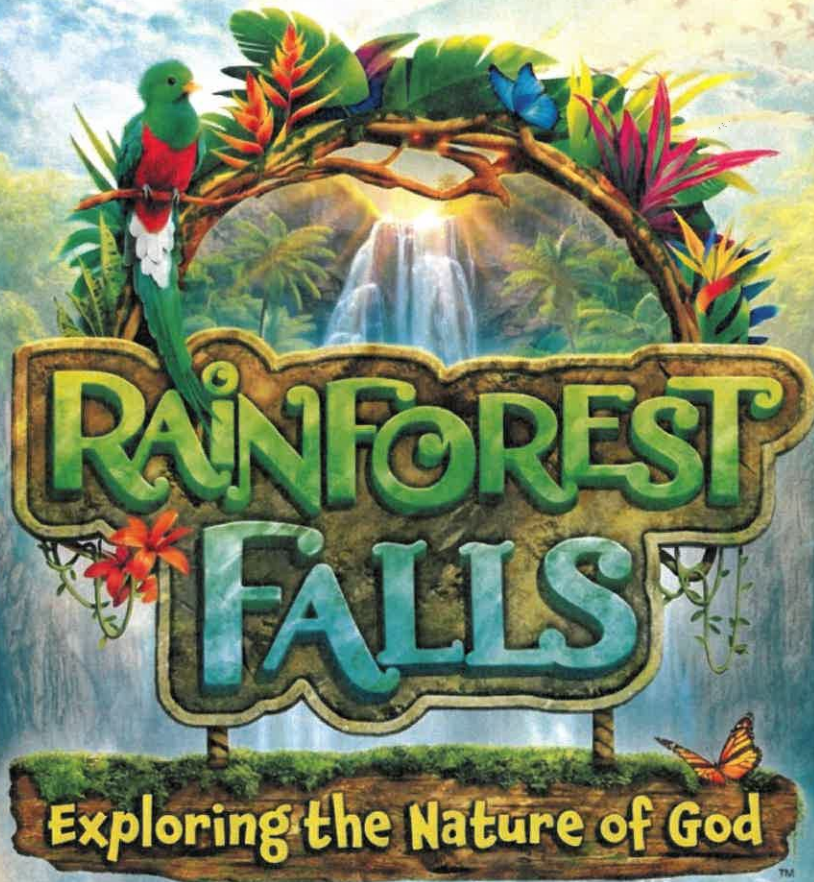

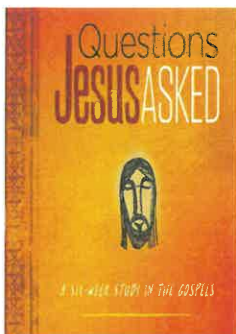
