"Let us not mock God with metaphor"

"For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his." - Romans 6:5

DEAR SPRING HILL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH FAMILY aster is in the air: bright pastel colors, crisp seersucker suits, blooming flowers, and every kind of candy in the world shaped to look like eggs. The commodification of Easter is in full force, rivaling Valentine's Day and Halloween as holidays that require you to buy "stuff." This season has not yet hit the same level of commercial value as Christmas, but just give it time. Part of the appeal of Easter as a wide-spread cultural phenomenon is its association with the beginning of Spring. The warming of the weather and sights and sounds of new life seem to fit right in with the story of Jesus' new life on Easter.

There's just one problem with this cozy co-opting of Easter into a celebration of Spring: it has nothing to do with the biblical story of the resurrection!!! Yes, the events did take place in this time of year because it occurred during the Passover celebration in Jerusalem. But the biblical story is about betrayal, sin, institutional violence, oppression, suffering, forsakenness, suffering, and death. AND THEN RESURRECTION. Jesus' death and resurrection is not some metaphor for the transition from winter into spring, from seeds into plants, from eggs into chicks, from cocoons into butterflies. The cycles of nature that repeat year after year are part of the process of creation, they are expected and anticipated. Jesus' return from the dead is anything but typical or cyclical. It wasn't natural. In fact, it was the very definition of supernatural-beyond and above the patterns of the world as we know it. Easter is the beginning of God's new creation, redeeming the brokenness of the old creation and setting us free from the dominion of death itself.

While it may be a good way to trick people into buying candy, the association of Jesus' resurrection with the bunnies and baby chicks is a wholesale cheapening of the power, wonder, shock, and death-conquering love that is at the heart of our Christian faith. The author John Updike conveys the unparalleled reality of the Easter story in a wonderfully, powerful poem called, "Seven Stanzas at Easter." He writes:

Make no mistake: if He rose at all it was as His body; if the cells' dissolution did not reverse, the molecules reknit, the amino acids rekindle, the Church will fall.

It was not as the flowers, each soft Spring recurrent; it was not as His Spirit in the mouths and fuddled eyes of the eleven apostles; it was as His flesh: ours.

The same hinged thumbs and toes, the same valved heart that-pierced-died, withered, paused, and then regathered out of enduring Might new strength to enclose.

Let us not mock God with metaphor, analogy, sidestepping, transcendence; making of the event a parable, a sign painted in the faded credulity of earlier ages: let us walk through the door.

The stone is rolled back, not papier-mâché, not a stone in a story, but the vast rock of materiality that in the slow grinding of time will eclipse for each of us the wide light of day.

And if we will have an angel at the tomb, make it a real angel, weighty with Max Planck's quanta, vivid with hair, opaque in the dawn light, robed in real linen spun on a definite loom.

Let us not seek to make it less monstrous, for our own convenience, our own sense of beauty, lest, awakened in one unthinkable hour, we are embarrassed by the miracle, and crushed by remonstrance.
