Wherever we go.

Most of you know that I was recently away. This was my annual, traditional, "brother trip." It is now traditional because we have done it twice. My older brother, I am the middle child, suggested that we travel together. At his age, he wisely said, "We can't wait." This year we traveled to Costa Rica. It is one of those places I have heard of but never visited. I have known many people who have vacationed there. I have one childhood friend who lives there most of the year. His visa makes it necessary for him to return to the U. S. every 90 days.

The best part about traveling with my brothers is that we have fun together. We like each other. We laugh a lot. We start stories with, "Remember when. . ." The pictures accompanying this article can be viewed symbolically. One shows a well-known animal famous for its slow movement. When you saw that picture, you may have thought that I was going to write about one of the seven deadly sins. When I took this picture of the sloth, it was moving. It was not moving so fast that I had to use special film to capture it, but it was moving.

The sloth is to Costa Rica like the koala is to Australia. They represent. They may even be a symbol. The sloth is not as immediately recognized with Costa Rica as the koala is with Australia. The sloth represents lifestyle, or a particular characteristic. Of course, most of that is not fair. The sloth has adapted to its environment. It has survived. Like all of the animals we saw in the rain forest and the cloud forest. The birds, insects, flowers, and bats have all learned how to survive.





As I listen to the stories people tell about their lives, I realize how valuable it is to survive. The survival of some people is miraculous. The bravery of some

people amazes me. Like the young woman in the colorful dress in the picture with me. She is very brave. She is dancing with me. I am not known as a dancer. When I told my wife that I had danced, even moved my feet, she said she wanted video proof. The evening of the dance was another opportunity for the three of us to share stories of our dancing experiences. We remembered when we were forced to attend dance classes when we were in the 6<sup>th</sup> grade. None of us are good dancers. One of my sons is a good dancer. He has performed on stage. One of my brothers has a daughter that has danced on stage. Maybe that gene skips a generation. Our Dad loved to dance.

Wherever we go we take memories with us. Sometimes we hear someone use the expression that we all carry "baggage" with us in life. Today, I am not thinking about carrying baggage. I am thinking about the memories we make when we travel. I am thinking about the memo-

ries we take with us when we relocate. Every year during Lent, I remember loss. I remember those I have loved and lost. There is something about the coming resurrection that helps me remember those who have gone before me, particularly those who have shown me the way. Wherever we go, those saints go with us. They are not baggage in the sense of weighing us down. They are our traveling companions. They walk with us.

Dear SHPC Friends,

Holy Week is upon us. With each passing year of ministry, the patterns of Holy Week impact me more deeply. Every year we remember Jesus' death and resurrection and remember death does not have the final word. Our culture struggles with the concept of death. Although all of us will have to face death, society can almost gloss over and hide the pain, suffering, and grief of losing someone that we love. Death is difficult. I recently was talking with a church member about the difficulty of death—the longer I serve this church, the greater the grief because I miss so many saints. Grief sneaks up at such surprising moments—walking down the hallways of the church and seeing someone's photo, looking at the church grounds and remembering those who have cared for them, walking through our Memorial Garden and seeing the names, hearing the choir singing and missing certain voices.

During Holy Week, we face the realities of death. Jesus dies on the cross at the age of 33 at the hands of the state, the people, and religious leaders. His disciples, not knowing what to do, fearful of losing their lives, run away and hide. On Good Friday, we leave the Chapel in darkness with no Charge or Benediction, in silence remembering the grief, sorrow, and pain of death.

We leave on Good Friday with no Benediction because we know that the story is not over and neither is our worship. Our worship continues on Easter morning when the women stumbled upon an empty tomb. Christ, though he died, is alive. He is risen! Death is not the final word. God conquers, overcomes death for us. Nothing in life and in death can separate us from God's love. I need the rituals of Holy Week to remind me of these truths—to process suffering, pain, and death in this world, and live in hope. Holy Week and the rituals of the church give me a container to hold grief, love, and hope together. I hope you will join us at 10:30 am on Palm Sunday (April 2), 6:00 pm on Maundy Thursday in the Chapel (April 6), noon on Good Friday in the Chapel (April 7), and 10:30 am Easter morning (April 9) as we remember, grieve, rejoice, and worship our risen Christ.

### Update-Covid 19 for Spring Hill Presbyterian Church March 2023




