turn from God's intentions. The story of Noah reminds us of the new creation and God's enduring covenant promises. The tales of Abraham and Sarah and their descendants serve to form our religious identity through the memory of God's creating a way where there seemed no way and no hope. Throughout all of these beginnings we have been reminded of the truth that God did not simply create in one isolated action, but that God has been and continues to recreate us over and over and over again, reforming us more and more into the image of Christ.

This month of August brings another exciting new beginning with the start of the school year. Children prepare to begin a new grade. Teachers prepare to welcome new classes. College students head off for new experiences that will mold them into the people God is calling them to be. As a church with a strong connection to institutions of education, this is an exciting time for us

as well. We will celebrate our

Back to School Sunday on August 13 honoring all our students and teachers (of all ages). Soon our choirs, youth group, Sunday school, confirmation, Bible studies, and so many other programs will return to full swing. Our mission to college students

through the UKirk South Alabama program will help welcome new faces to campus. Our Big Brother/Big Sister, Backpack for Kids, and Mary B. Austin volunteers will all begin rolling their sleeves up for another wonderful year of service in our many school partnerships. Our Boy Scout troop will return to its activities, and this year we will be hosting a new Girl Scout troop as well (talk to Amy Powell and Sarah McGough for more details about it). On Monday and Tuesday afternoons the sound of beautiful music will return to our hallways as many children from around our community will return to their rehearsals with Mobile Singing Children. All in all, the beginning of the school year is a very full time for the mission and ministry of this learning and welcoming church family.

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This fall we will also celebrate another new beginning, one that took place centuries ago. 2017 is the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Protestant Reformation in Europe. Those first reformers (like Martin Luther, Ulrich Zwingli, and John Calvin) sought to correct the abuses of the Mediaeval Church by returning to the beginnings of our faith story. They used the witness of scripture and the example of the early church as their authorities in matters of faith and life together. As a fitting way to honor their memory and follow their wisdom, this Fall we will begin a series of worship services and churchwide events entitled, "Back to the Source." This was a rallying cry used by those reformers to remind their churches to turn back to the source of scripture as their guide. So too will we be examining what the Bible teaches about many concepts, doctrines, and vocabulary of the faith that we may take for granted today.

We continue to welcome many visitors and new members who are beginning new chapters of their journey of faith here with our church family. Through the very successful initial phase of our Welcoming the Next Generations capital campaign, we are building a solid foundation to continue to be the kind of Christian community that welcomes people of all ages. With so many new beginnings in our midst, it is important for us to remember that this work is not our own to initiate, but that our acts of service, dedication, faithfulness, and growth are a part of God's new creation coming into being for us to come. This work begins and in ends in the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ who has ushered the inbreaking of God's kingdom "on earth as it is in heaven." May all our beginnings and endings find their source in the one who is "the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end."

Dear Friends in Faith,

This July, you didn't see me much because I spent two weeks in Decatur, GA taking the introductory course for my Doctorate of Ministry degree program in Gospel, Culture, and Transformation of the Church. I have been studying with 15 pastors,--7 Jamaicans, 1 Jamaican American, 4 white Americans, 2 Korean American pastors, and 1 Taiwanese American. I was the only white female pastor. To say that the group was diverse was an understatement. It is the most diverse group I have ever been a part of. In this group, you might wonder, what are the commonalities theologically and culturally? How do you define culture and the gospel in such a diverse group? We came from such different backgrounds with different assumptions and views.

A theologian named Kathryn Tanner provides an interesting lens into what unites us culturally and specifically as Christians. She looks at the word culture, and how we have defined it over time. She tries to figure out what defines the Christian culture. We range in beliefs in the Christian faith—there are some who believe women can be leaders, others don't. We disagree how Scripture is interpreted often. Every time you try to say that what makes a Christian is X, there is a person who defies the definition. Think about it, what makes us Presbyterian? What makes us Spring Hill Presbyterian? We all range in our beliefs and opinions. Is there one thing that we can all agree on? Eventually, she says that a culture is not bound by a common agreement but by a common engagement. People in cultures often range in their ideas, in their beliefs, and actions. No two people are alike. What creates a culture is common engagement -relationships, conversation, communion. For Christians, what binds us is Christ, being engaged in the Gospel. And how we do that is through arguing, through discussion, through wrestling with the texts and individual interpretations of them.

For her, the Christian identity hinges on staying open to the direction of the grace of God in Christ Jesus. God is not finished with us. God is at work in our communities, in our churches, in our world. This means that often there is dissonance and disagreement as we

listen to God at work in our church and world. Tanner actually advocates for dissonance and disagreement—that's where God is present she thinks. God is in our wrestling because we are engaged with each other and with God.

This is a new idea for me. Growing up in the South it wasn't good to argue. I did not like difference and conflict. I wanted everyone to think like me and thought if I argued well enough, people



would agree with me. I think that there are some unshakeable truths about God and Jesus. Yet, if I am so caught up in my idea of who God is, can I see God in my neighbor? Am I open to God at work in my life, in the world shaking me up and changing me? God is the God of all, in all of our uniqueness, in all of our diversity.

I think these ideas have a profound affect on our community. It means that we can be diverse theologically and still be the body of Christ together. It means that we cannot write each other off. God is at work in each and every one of us. It means that even in times of fracture and brokenness, God is at work reforming our minds and our faith, helping us grow in discipleship and communion. For me, that's good news.

This Fall, we are exploring the idea of "Back to the Source"—we will be looking at common words that we use in the church that are in our Scriptures like salvation, tithing, sacrifice, sin and thinking about what these have meant historically and what they mean for us today. Some of these words incite disagreement and discussion, and for us that's good news—it means that our faith is dynamic, that God is with us in our wrestling, in our growing and learning.
