Pondering

I have been thinking about the women in my life, past and present, and how I have been changed by them. This article had its beginning when I was leading the Wednesday Bible study, "Word in the Week." The text for the day was Luke 2.1-21. It is in that reading that Mary "ponders." Ponders is a great word.

The word "pondering" got me started – pondering. Maybe it's because it was Mary who was pondering, I started pondering about the women in my life. I started with my Mom. I know it is a cliché but I started with her. Obviously, I would not be here if not for my Mom. She taught me experientially how to love. She showed me how to respect others and myself. One lesson that I was slow to learn from her was a love of learning. When I was in seminary my Dad became a dialysis patient. My Mom had to learn to be his dialysis nurse in order to hook him up to the machine at home. That made me remember how my Mom had gone back to college when my younger brother was old enough to stay in school all day. I remember her studying while she cooked supper.

Most of the things I tell premarital couples about marriage, I learned from my wife. Usually I start with the story about seeing the mold on the floor in our shower. We had been married about a month. I was a typically sexist husband who expected the "wife" to clean the house. After telling Sally about the mold she said, "You know, when I am in the shower I don't wear my glasses and I can't see my feet. So, if you can see mold on the floor, you better clean it." She was not defensive. It was a matter-of-fact. You see it. You clean it. That works in most cases. There was one time Sally was wrong. One of our sons came in from playing and his head was bloody. A piece of a concrete block hit him in the head. I said that it was nothing. Head wounds bleed profusely. Sally insisted on taking him to the closest "doc in the box." When she returned, to her credit, she said the doc said, "Head wounds bleed profusely." Our son didn't need stitches. A very small victory. Because any sane person would have taken him to the emergency department to get him checked. The rest of that story is that our younger son had dropped the block on his head.

Most of my teachers were women. Except for two men in high school, all of my public school teachers were women. My favorite history professor in college was a woman. Her name was Mary Washington. No kidding. Isn't that a great name for a history professor? I remember Miss Eloise Long, who taught fourth grade to all three of us brothers. When my younger brother was starting the fourth grade he was not in Miss Long's class. My Dad went to the school and told the principal he wanted my brother in Miss Long's class. The principal went to his class, stood in the door and said, "Alan, come with me. Your Dad wants you in Miss Long's class." I think it helped that my Dad and the principal were in the same Sunday school class. And that a Speaker boy had been in that school for 16 uninterrupted years. Miss Long taught all of us the multiplication tables. She was so far ahead of her time that she had a woman come to our class once a week to teach us Spanish.

Along the way I learned from my aunts and female cousins; from girlfriends and female clergy. I particularly learned from female chaplains. I have the gift of empathy, but I had to learn the discipline of pastoral care. Most of my female colleagues seem to intuitively know how to care for others.

Whenever I read that Mary "pondered all these things in her heart." I know exactly what she was doing.

This Advent I am particularly drawn to Luke 1:26-38, The Annunciation. Being pregnant this Advent helps me see Mary and Christ's birth in new ways. Mary most likely was less than half my age when she found out that she was going to be the mother of the Christ-child. She was living in the backwaters of Nazareth, not in the seat of power of Jerusalem. She was poor. She was a virgin and inexperienced. She was young and a woman in a society that valued men, status, and maturity. Yet, God sees Mary. God favors Mary. God chooses Mary to bear God with us, Emmanuel into this world. Mary says yes to such a large and overwhelming task, to grow, birth, and raise the son of God. I cannot imagine the whispers Mary was subjected to being unwed and pregnant, yet she and Joseph both say yes to this grand and glorious call. Mary is told that "nothing will be impossible with God," which is spoken to Abraham and Sarah in Genesis too. Commentators say that this is the "creed behind all creeds". Through our faith, we affirm that nothing is impossible with God. God enters the world as a tiny child; Christ performs miracles healing the sick and raising the dead. On the cross, death is defeated. Nothing is impossible. Mary's story reminds us that the Lord works through each one of us to fulfill God's purposes, and sometimes we have to block reason out to step out in faith, courage, and trust.

Our theme this Advent is "From Generation to Generation." Later in Mary's Magnificat, Mary sings, "Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation." (Luke 1:48b-50). This theme is reflected in our Advent devotional, which you can access digitally or in paper version, in worship, and through some special Advent crafts that children, youth, and adults will be able to do (children and youth during Dec. 10 Adventfest.) This Advent, I am excited to explore how we tell this story, the story of Emmanuel, God coming into this world from generation to generation. How we pass down our faith, our hope, and the power of the Gospel.

As you know, I am pregnant and our child will be here around December 6. I have been so grateful for this church family and how they will teach my children God's story passing it down from one generation to another. Thank you for the most special baby shower, the church gift that has been used to purchase car seats and supplies, your prayers and support. I am grateful for the time away that will enable me to bond with this child and return ready to continue ministry together again.

CHANGE TO ONLINE CONTRIBUTION FEE SCHEDULE

Effective 10/31/22, STRIPE, SHPC's on line contribution system provider, has increased fee for ACH bank donation from \$0.25 to \$0.30 per transaction. Recurring donations set up as "fee covered" will be effected by this change reducing the Contribution amount by \$0.05 per transaction. If your donation is not set up as "fee covered", the church pays for this charge. PNC Update

The Pastoral Nominating Committee (PNC) has begun the process of determining who God is calling to serve our congregation as its next pastoral leader. In doing so, we would like to ensure that you, our congregation, are kept informed of not only the process we will be working through, but also the progress we are making along the way. The first step, which we are just beginning, is writing the Ministry Information Form (MIF), a document that will provide a picture of the mission and ministry of the congregation, including ministry context, demographics, history, theology, values, leadership needs, and expectations. We would love the congregation's input in preparing the MIF; thus, you will be receiving a survey soon to discern what characteristics you feel are most important in our new pastor. We may also conduct listening sessions and, of course, request your prayers throughout the process. Since well written MIF's clearly communicate these characteristics and ensure the best referrals, the Committee will work with diligence and patience to provide the best narrative possible.

We hope this information gives you a better understanding of the search process and ask for your continued prayers as God leads us forward.



A January Preview Epiphany Star Words

Jan. 8-Jan. 29 you are invited to receive a "Star Word." A star word is a word that we invite you to use as a guiding word throughout the year to follow, reflect on, and ponder. Much like the Wise Men followed the star in the sky, we hope this word will help you to reflect and see where God is calling you. You can receive a star word in worship at the tree in the Narthex or in a basket in the hallway.

The use of star words, is a prayer practice connected to Epiphany and the new year that has been growing in popularity in Protestant churches for nearly a decade now. There are many reasons behind this tradition. First, we know that the Magi followed a star, which ultimately led them to Jesus. Therefore, we too use all the resources we have available to us—including creative prayer practices and intentional words for the new year—to move closer to Jesus.

Secondly, we trust that God uses multiple ways to guide us and speak to us. Star words are one such lens that might provide us with a way to look for God in our midst, both actively and in hindsight.

Finally, we trust that it is often easy to miss God in our daily midst. Having an intentional word to consider both in present days, as well as to reflect on at the end of the year, allows for us to see God in ways we may not have seen God before.

By not looking or sorting through the star words at their selection, we practice the spiritual task of receiving. It is not we who are in control in this moment. Instead, we trust that God is present, and we let go of our desire to cultivate or control. We hope you will join us in the spiritual practice of selecting a star word in January!

BIBLE DISCOVERY— Come join us in the conference room on Sunday mornings at 9:15 and help us delve into God's Word as it applies to us today.



Last year was a big success with around 80 people participating in our church-wide Common Read for the 40 Days of Lent. One of the things people commented on most favorably was getting to know those in their small group so much better.

While we won't do this *every* year, as we come back to inperson worship on a more regular basis, this seems like a perfect way to engage again – a second helping of deep learning and fellowship, this time focused on scripture.
