Dear SHPC Friends,

Our theme this Advent is "How Does a Weary World Rejoice?" This phrase is taken from the hymn, "O Holy Night." The hymn goes:

O holy night, the stars are brightly shining, It is the night of the dear Savior's birth; Long lay the world in sin and error pining, Till he appeared and the soul felt its worth. A thrill of hope the weary world rejoices, For yonder breaks a new and glorious morn;

Fall on your knees, Oh hear the angel voices! O night divine! O night when Christ was born. O night, O holy night, O night divine.

When I hear this hymn, I am always transported to Christmas Eve services here at Spring Hill Presbyterian. Each year, this hymn is sung at the evening service. Sometimes a soloist, sometimes a trio—it reminds me of the power of Christ's birth. The singers change each year—the singers are rarely the same and yet, it is something so powerful and enduring to hear those voices harmonize and individually proclaim the hope, justice, and joy of Christ's birth. "A thrill of hope the weary world rejoices"—we often don't think of hope and thrill together—but I love this image of a jolt of hope. Hope comes when we need it but least expect it, awakening us to the reality that God is with us. We are not alone. Surprise! A baby is born.

We are weary. We are weary from bad news, heartache, illness, grief, and sorrow. We are weary-overextended in this season. We are weary, and yet through Christ this weary world rejoices. A seed of hope is planted within us. We wake up to joy. This Advent, I hope we can hold space for both weariness and joy. We seek "a thrill of hope" in our hurting world.

How does a weary world rejoice? I like to think we rejoice day by day, with God's help. We rejoice in our singing—especially together as we sing the familiar hymns of Advent and Christmas and on Cantata Sunday, December 3 and with our children and youth, December 10. We rejoice lighting one candle at a time as we watch for our Messiah. We rejoice in our preparations, collecting pine, holly, magnolia, and decorating our Sanctuary December 9 at 9:00 am at Adventfest. We rejoice in telling the story in worship and especially at Lessons and Carols, December 17. We rejoice in our study, reading our Advent devotional and through acts of love through Advent calendars and the Alternative Gift Market. If you are looking for hope and joy in this weary world, I hope that you will come here, to church—together we find it through Christ, in Christ, with Christ.

Epiphany Star Words:

Jan. 7-Jan. 28 you are invited to receive a "Star Word." A star word is a word that we invite you to use as a guiding word throughout the year to follow, reflect on, and ponder. Much like the Wise Men followed the star in the sky, we hope this word will help you to reflect and see where God is calling you. You can receive a star word in worship at the tree in the front or in a basket in the hallway. This year, we have had many requests for time to talk about our star words. We will plan to have a Star Word check-in where people can gather in small groups to share about their word on Feb. 25 at 9:00 am.

The use of star words, is a prayer practice connected to Epiphany and the new year that has been growing in popularity in Protestant churches for nearly a decade now. There are many reasons behind this tradition. First, we know that the Magi followed a star, which ultimately led them to Jesus. Therefore, we too use all the resources we have available to us—including creative prayer practices and intentional words for the new year—to move closer to Jesus.

Secondly, we trust that God uses multiple ways to guide us and speak to us. Star words are one such lens that might provide us with a way to look for God in our midst, both actively and in hindsight.

Finally, we trust that it is often easy to miss God in our daily midst. Having an intentional word to consider both in present days, as well as to reflect on at the end of the year, allows for us to see God in ways we may not have seen God before.

By not looking or sorting through the star words at their selection, we practice the spiritual task of receiving. It is not we who are in control in this moment. Instead, we trust that God is present, and we let go of our desire to cultivate or control. We hope you will join us in the spiritual practice of selecting a star word in January!



"Christmas is coming and the geese are getting fat", a fact that I care nought about. What I do care about is cancelled stamps. For a refresher reminder, there is a labeled collection box for stamps located in the Mission Room. Tearing off affixed canceled stamps from envelopes, leaving a minimal ¼ inch border on all 4 sides, and dumping the stamps into the labeled box is recycling at its easiest. I take the stamps, trim, prepare, and send them to a

volunteer enterprise in Florida which packages and sends them onward to stamp brokers in Asia. The monies from sales of these tamps are then sent to a Christian publishing house in Argentina which prints Sunday School materials for emerging churches in South and Central America.

This mission program amazingly generates a yearly average of more than \$50,000 and has been in existence since 1972. 2021 marked the milestone of a cumulative earnings of greater than \$1 million for the mission work. Stamps are collected by persons representing organizations from all over the USA. We are one of many but an important entity.
