

"Woven Together: In So Many Ways"

Dear Spring Hill Presbyterian Church Family,

As we continue to progress through our year-long churchwide theme of "Woven Together," I keep seeing more and more connections in the life of this church family. Have you had that experience, as well? How we worship and how we fellowship are woven together. How we learn and how we serve are woven together. Renovations to our physical plant and renovations to our church website are woven together. Welcoming visitors and new members in our midst and saying good bye to long-time friends are woven together. Baptisms, weddings, and funerals are woven together. What makes us laugh and what makes us cry are woven together. The connections are there...and they are strong in this church family.

During this month of February, we are making our way through a sermon series on Jesus' Sermon on the Mount found in the gospel of Matthew. In this important collection of teachings, Jesus reveals himself to be a master weaver, tying together the threads of faith and action, identity and ethics. Connecting these two ideas (love of God and love of neighbor) is not an easy task, but it is at the very heart of who we are called to be and what we are called to do as disciples of Jesus Christ. It's often very tempting to put all of our energy and effort into one of these two threads at the expense of the other. Sometimes we focus our time and resources on serving the needs of other people (whether they are friends or complete strangers) but ignore our relationship with God. Or sometimes we feel drawn into deep spiritual moments of devotion and adoration of our Creator but ignore the harsh realities of the rest of the world around us. That can happen to individuals, but it can also happen to churches.

Instead, Christ invites us to weave together our lives of Christian discipleship in ways that make connections between love of God and love of neighbor, ultimately growing to the point that we see these two as one and same.

Presbyterians have long celebrated our identity as a "connectional church." When we use that phrase we are usually describing the way that our church polity connects us with other Presbyterian congregations in our local area and around the country through a web of relationships. However, I think our "connectional church" model goes even deeper than just our church polity. Following Christ's invitation from the Sermon on the Mount, we Presbyterians have also been a people who have placed a lot of emphasis on connecting our love of God and love of neighbor. We strive to connect our theology with our social ethics. As far back as 1788 the Presbyterian Church (USA) was expressing this connectional nature as we adopted and approved a list of Principles of Church Order (kind of like the church's version of the Bill of Rights). One of these Principles states, "That truth is in order to goodness;" and "that there is an inseparable connection between faith and practice, truth and duty." In other words, the truth that we believe about who God (as revealed in Jesus Christ) leads us to live lives of practical service (characterized by sacrificial love for the sake of our human family).

See, even our history and our mission are woven together! So, in the days ahead, as members of this connectional church family, I hope that you will look for the connections but also that you will make the connections. When you see loose threads, weave them together. Make those connections between our worship, service, prayer, and devotion to God with concrete and practical acts of outreach to others in our community and around the earth. Because the good news of the gospel is that in Christ, it's all woven together.
