

SPRING HILL MESSENGER February 2023

The Season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and ends either on Maundy Thursday, or at sundown on Holy Saturday (with the celebration of the Easter Vigil), or with Holy Week (beginning of Palm Sunday). It is much easier to keep up with the beginning of Lent in Mobile because of Mardi Gras. The season lasts forty days.

Lent is the shortened Old English for *lencten*, which means "spring season." Similar words can be found in other languages (Dutch and German) which also refer to spring. The Greek word *sarakosti* (and its longer form *tessarakosti*) mean "fortieth."

If you are wondering how that period of time can be only forty days, it is because the Sundays are not included. From the very early days in the church, we recognized that every Sunday is a little Easter.

This Lenten season we will celebrate each week on Wednesday with a chapel service (in the chapel) including communion. The services will also include scripture, prayers from both our *Book of Common Worship* and the *Common Order* book from the Church of Scotland, and a homily.

As Presbyterians we do not have a strong tradition of Lenten preparation, at least not compared to our Roman Catholic or Orthodox friends. When we think about giving something up for lent, we think about giving up something like chocolate. One year I gave up drinking real coffee. I still don't drink real (with caffeine) coffee. I buy a store brand decaf coffee. I called the consumer "hot line" number I found on the can to ask how much caffeine is in the decaf. There are two grams of caffeine in an eight ounce cup. That compares to 80 -- 100 in real coffee. After I settled into drinking decaf, I felt rather self-righteous about it. I was like those people who used to smoke and quit. The main reason I continue drinking decaf is that I realized I had been addicted to the caffeine. I don't want to be addicted to anything.

One of the characteristics that goes with being a theologian is that I can always see the other side. If I was a really good theologian I could see four sides to every issue. I settle for two. I think to myself that I don't want to be addicted because I want to be in control of my life. That's not a bad thing if the alternatives are nicotine or alcohol controlling my life. But what if my real issue is that I need to always be in control. I pondered that for a while and decided that was not it. What I finally figured out is that I don't need the caffeine. I wake up looking forward to going to work. I love what I do. I don't need caffeine to wake me up, or to "rev" me up. I get excited thinking about the church and all we can do. Just imagine: we are part of the kingdom of God.

For years now my Lenten discipline is to start something new, rather than give up something. Here is an easy one for this congregation: start praying with your Star Word as your guide.

I hope to see you in church.

WEDNESDAY LENTEN SERVICE

There will be Wednesday Lenten communion services in the chapel each week at 12:00 p.m. starting on February 22.

Dear SHPC Friends,

You probably weren't expecting to hear from me during my maternity leave! I tried to prepare a few things in advance, so you could stay up to date with what is happening at SHPC. This February, I am excited by our Common Read study focusing on Amy Jill Levine's "Signs and Wonders." This will be different from our study last year, focusing much more deeply on Scripture. Dr. Levine is a professor of New Testament at Vanderbilt University, and her book looks at Jesus' signs and wonders from Scripture. It has been amazing to see how this connects with our star words—I think especially during this interim season we need stars to guide us to Christ and to study how Jesus shows us signs and wonders reminding us of God's presence with us. I hope that as we look at Christ's signs and wonders from Scripture, we will see signs and wonders in our own lives too.

Beginning Feb. 26 and continuing throughout the season of Lent (until April 2), we will see Christ's wonders in our Common Read. We will divide into small groups of 8-10 people and facilitators will help guide conversations around Scripture and the book "Signs and Wonders". Amy Jill Levine will be in Mobile this fall at Dauphin Way Methodist, so stay tuned for a field trip this fall! Most groups will meet in person at the church on Sunday mornings at 9:00 am, but we will also have a Sunday morning 9:00 am Zoom option, as well as a mid-week option. We have recruited facilitators. We have ordered books. Now we just need you to commit be joining us.

Here are my top six reasons why YOU should sign up for our Common Read:

To study and learn more in Scripture—as Christians we are called to be grounded in God's Word.

To get to know people in our congregation better (or even meet new people)!

To grow in your faith.

To see signs and wonders in your own life and in our church.

To do something together as a church family.

Because it will be fun! And God will be at work!

STAMPS

Friends, many of you have been faithful in tearing out stamps from your own correspondence and placing them into the collection box; I have trimmed them and sent them forward. In case this is all new information to you, there is an identified box in the Mission room to place your can-



celled stamps. Any affixed stamp is appropriate. Please leave a border of more than ¼ inch on all sides so that I can trim them appropriately. I package the trimmed stamps into categories: 1st class, Christmas, Love, Pre-sorted/non-profit, and Foreign and send them to Florida where sorting into more specific categories is accomplished and all is sent to stamp brokers for sale in Asia. Profits made from this process are then forwarded to a publishing house in Argentina which is dedicated to writing and publishing Sunday School materials in Spanish. These materials are now being sold in 8 Latin American countries plus the United States, and Spain, and are used by over 40 Protestant denominations.

I spoke recently with one of the leaders where I send our stamp donations and she explained that in 2022, the Christian and Missionary Alliance (that's where profits from the stamp sales go) garnered \$35,000. The Alliance began in 1971, with collections from all over the US and Canada (I began collecting from SHP about 8 years ago), and this past summer profits for the Alliance passed the \$1 million mark! Who could imagine that the lonely little cancelled stamp could raise so much money? "Little is much when God is in it" is the motto of the Alliance and it has proven to be so.


