DEAR SPRING HILL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH FAMILY.

I am so excited about our upcoming Summer Series. This year, our worship services and sermons will focus on the letters of the New Testament. These important documents (called "epistles") were formative for our Christian tradition and were written to congregations and individuals in the early decades of the church. They all speak about the power of the gospel to transform the world, the mystery and revelation of Jesus's death and resurrection, and the character of a Christian life we are called to lead in response to God's grace. Each letter speaks to a different context among the churches to whom they were addressed. Part of our work in the sermons will include filling in these backstories of what was going on in Corinth, Rome, Thessalonica, Galatia, and many other settings. As is the case today, each of these congregations were struggling with their own critical issues. The Apostle Paul, and the other writers of the letters, sought to speak a word of grace and peace into each difficult situation. Some were dealing with times of division, others with how to welcome people who are different than themselves, others had issues around poverty and wealth, or with persecution by the Roman authorities. One of the letters was even written to encourage a congregation to welcome a runaway slave. All of them are grounded in the gospel and show the ways in which the early Christians were seeking to be as faithful as they could to their Lord, Jesus Christ. As ancient as they are, these epistles are therefore immediately relevant to us as well.

Each week's sermon will include the challenge to our whole congregation to write a particular letter in the days that follow. Some will be thank you letters, words of encouragement, advice letters, letters to the next generation, letters to the editor, and many more. Each week's letter writing assignment will grow out of the Biblical letter that we are

studying and the wisdom that it contains.

Also, once again our Religious Arts Committee has been hard at work putting together an outstanding summer Sunday School series to accompany what we will be studying in worship. They've lined up a fantastic slate of speakers from both within our congregation and our broader Mobile community to speak during the Sunday school hour (9:00 AM in the Fellowship Hall) about a wide range of topics that intersect with our faith. Be sure to see the list of speakers printed in this newsletter. Pin that page to your fridge or input it into your calendar so you can refer to it throughout the summer. More information about each speaker will be shared on our church's Facebook page each week before their presentation.

In addition, Rev. Anna Fulmer Duke and our Christian Education Committee have prepared a wonderful intergenerational summer devotion that you can use with your children each week, including when you may be out of town on summer vacation. This resource, which is completely unique and designed for our particular congregation is a wonderful way to keep connected to your church family even when you can't be here in person or to share you faith with friends and family when you visit them.

Dear Friends,

Listen.-Pray, Follow

After the Enneagram series, I have been thinking about a principle that I heard years ago that I must constantly remind myself of: "Stop shoulding on yourself." Often, we have grand plans, to-do lists, goals, dreams—and we want to reach them! We want to move beyond ourselves, our limitations and grow closer to God in real ways. Yet, the worst thing I think we can do is to "should" on ourselves. You might be familiar with this phenomenon: "I should work out every day." "I should read my Bible.." "I should go to church this morning." "I shouldn't feel this way—what is wrong with me?"

"Shoulding" only causes our guilt and shame to grow. It does not lead to real change. We punish ourselves, instead of affirming where we are growing and changing. It also takes God out of the equation. We stop asking the question, "Where is God already moving and changing in my life?" When we "should" do something, we stop wondering. Maybe there is a reason we are hesitant? We stop doing the deeper work of asking what is stopping us. We ignore our own "liabilities and limits." Instead of "shoulding" on ourselves, maybe we should lean on words of Scripture. Maybe we should think about our calling and vocation.

Scripture calls us to lead fuller and truer lives. This is not done through guilt and shame. Instead of saying we should do something; Jesus calls us, beckons us: Jesus says, "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." Matthew 11:28-30.

Jesus calls disciples to drop their nets and follow him. Jesus does not say, you should do this or else... Instead, he freely invites them, and they freely accept.

Parker Palmer says it a bit differently in his book, <u>Let Your Life Speak</u>, a book about calling and vocation. He writes, "Vocation (calling) does not come from willfulness (shoulding). It comes from listening. I must try to listen to my life and try to understand what it is truly about—quite apart from what I would like it to be about—or my life will never represent anything real in the world, no matter how earnest my intentions."

This summer, in all of the opportunities you will have, I invite you to do some holy listening. Journal. Pray. Go on walks. Find time and space to listen in whatever ways you can. Stop shoulding. It doesn't work: "sometimes the 'shoulds' do not work because the life one is living runs crosswise to the grains of one's soul" (Palmer, 41).

This summer at SHPC is a time of grand adventures. Yet, in the midst of all of the grand adventures, find time and space to discover more about who you are and who God is calling you to be!




