Gratitude: Relational not Material

Dear Spring Hill Presbyterian Family,

n this month of November we are surrounded by the theme of Thanksgiving, which at first glance can seem like a good thing. After all, isn't thankfulness a positive virtue that we want our society to aspire toward? Well, yes...sort of. Gratitude or thankfulness has the potential to form us into humble, loving, generous people. But as our culture leans into the Thanksgiving season we are presented with a reason for thanksgiving that is rooted in a modern materialism that is quite at odds with our Christian faith. Commercials that tug at the heart in order to sell you a new smart phone, door buster sales that reinforce the "idolatry of possessions," and images of lavish worldly abundance that ignore the real hunger of those struggling to make it in our worldthese are all patterns of commerce that besiege us so much in this season that it's hard to see through them. But deep down, they all assume that our thanksgiving is and should be for the things that we have-material possessions.

In the Bible, however, thanksgiving is rooted in a fundamentally different cause: what God has done for us. In the Old Testament, the ancient Hebrews respond to God's pattern of liberation and protection with Psalms of Thanksgiving. In the New Testament, the early Church orients the life of the community of faith around gratitude for God's gift of grace made real in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Biblical gratitude is always relational, not material.

This month at SHPC, we have many opportunities for you to engage in that second, Biblical kind of thanksgiving:

- Our Fall Stewardship Campaign continues as pledge cards are turned in. Practicing generous sacrificial giving—tithing—is a strong biblical practice that stands in stark contrast to the "idolatry of possessions." In Christian stewardship our gratitude to God matters in real, concrete ways. Pledge cards can still be turned in to the church office or through the offering plate.
- On SUNDAY NOVEMBER 4 we will celebrate ALL SAINTS SUNDAY in worship, a day in which we gather around the Lord's Table for the eucharistic feast of thanksgiving, and we share prayers of gratitude for the life and love of "all the saints who from their labors rest." We will read aloud the names of those who have died in the church over the past year and give thanks and praise to God for their love. We will also give thanks for God's grace reflected in the sacrament of Baptism and the beautiful music of our children's choirs. It's a Sunday you definitely don't want to miss.
- On **SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 18** we will highlight many mission and service opportunities through our congregation in which our gratitude for God's grace can come alive. That morning will be our annual Alternative Gift Market (see more details in this newsletter). This is a wonderful way to show love with your family and friends that does not reinforce the materialism of the season.

A CELEBRATION OF CRECHES

Many families have one or more treasured crèches that are displayed in their home each Advent season. In addition to the celebration of the birth of Christ, the crèche may represent the remembrance of a loved one, long held family traditions and stories, a souvenir of family travels or a gift from the hands of a talented friend made especially for your family. During the Advent Festival, Sunday, December 2, you are invited to share your crèche and its story with your church family at Spring Hill Presbyterian Church. Each crèche will be displayed prominently in locations around the church building, the Fellowship Hall, the Library and others, as needed. Crèches may be set up Saturday, December 1, during choir rehearsal between 9:00 a.m. - noon, or before Sunday School (9:00) Sunday morning. Members of the Religious Arts Committee will be available to assist with setup and will watch over the displays for security on Sunday. They may be viewed by the congregation Sunday morning and during the Advent Festival Sunday afternoon.

Wake (p! This is Your Life!

Dear Friends,

As many of you know, I enjoy riding my bike. I wake-up early on Saturday mornings and am geared out with lights, a light-weight triathlon bike, and a group of friends. There's a group who calls themselves "Stop and Smell the Roses"—they take leisurely jaunts. I am not usually a "Stop and Smell the Roses" kind of girl. I want to enjoy my ride, but I want to also get a good work-out. If I am waking up at 5:15 am on a Saturday morning, we better go somewhere!

Recently, though I have taken up a new form of biking. I have started commuting to church on Sunday afternoons for youth group on my bike. I don't ride my fancy triathlon bike. Instead, I ride my sister's abandoned clunker. A heavy brand-less bike that creaks and groans. And instead of riding miles and miles, I ride 3-4 miles. These afternoon jaunts remind me of the joy of traveling slowly, without a rush. They remind me to notice things—sometimes my legs burning, other times the feel of the air as it passes by. They have made me wonder if I am turning into a "stop and smell the roses" kind of person. Riding my clunky bike makes me feel like a kid again—my goal isn't to ride fast or to get in better shape. My goal is to enjoy my ride.

This alternative form of travel is making me aware of how often I am so driven to make it to my destination: the church, my house, the hospital, the gym that I never notice the journey. I tune out my surroundings with the

radio, my thoughts, my multitasking. I can drive for miles and miles and not be able to remember what I saw along the way.

And yet God speaks. God says to me over and over, "Wake up! This is your life! This drive, the in-between times make up your life! Are you just going to let them pass by in anticipation of where you are headed?" In our church's theme of journeying together I am finding that the point isn't where Jesus is going (or I am going); Jesus stops along the way. He notices people. He stays in the moment—he doesn't become so focused on where he is going that he ignores the people and experiences around him.

In this season we can get swept up in what's coming —Thanksgiving, Advent, Christmas, New Year's. It can be overwhelming. It can be numbing. But there's another alternative: may we stop. Pause. Find something that makes us feel alive. An experience that helps us appreciate the present moment, whatever that moment brings. Maybe its riding your bike, working on a puzzle, swinging, taking a swim, sitting outside, calling a friend who makes you laugh, sewing, an ice-cream. Wake-up! This is your life! May you find peace and hope stopping along your journey to smell the roses.

How many of you get Christmas catalogues in the mail?

How many of you get more Christmas catalogues in the mail than you would ever care to receive? This is to introduce you to one which will not come to you – you will have to make an effort to get it; yet, it is the most important gift catalogue in the world.

During the Spanish Civil War in 1936-1939, Dan West worked in the front lines as an aid worker. From this vantage point he saw, first hand, the devastating effects of that conflict in the forms of hunger and lack of clothing. So it was that he founded Heifer International in 1944. His vision, which has now become reality, was that, instead of providing food to the hungry and clothing to those in need of it, a methodology which would give them the requisite animals, education and training necessary to provide food and clothing for them and others would

enable that methodology to produce an unending stream of renewable resources.

God has graced our family with an abundance of material gifts. Because of this, my wife and I have used the Christmas Season to teach the younger generation what is truly necessary and important and how one's priorities should be ordered. In this regard, my wife and I have chosen to take the funds which would otherwise go toward gifts for each individual family member and use those funds to make a donation to Heifer International. Every year on Christmas Eve a card is passed around the dinner table so that everyone, most importantly, the children, can learn specifically what composite gift, given in each of their names, has been given to those most in need. In this way, hopefully, a blessed tradition of giving will be perpetuated.
