#### A Word from Pastor Anna

Dear SHPC Family,

You are probably already thinking about how your holidays will be different. Maybe you are planning your celebrations outside. Maybe you are not able to see loved ones who live far away. Maybe what was once a huge celebration has to be paired down. Each year, the holidays are filled with both joy and grief, but this year the grief seems compounded. There is a yearning for things to return to "normal."

As people of faith, we are ritual people. There are the big rituals of our faith like the saying Lord's Prayer, Communion, Baptism, Memorial Services, and prayers. There are also small rituals, ordinary acts that take on meaning that often go unnoticed. As Presbyterians who do things "decently and in order," the order of worship, music, a beadle and crucifer, a bulletin are rituals. These ordinary acts bring a sense of peace and order. We like for things to feel normal; we like rituals. Rituals hold our joy and pain in holy containers. Our rituals help us connect to God in ways we cannot describe. Often, rituals are something we take for granted. But if 2020 has taught me anything is that we may not notice when rituals are there, but we certainly notice when rituals are gone or changed. In the past few weeks, we have been able to return to some old rituals; some people are now able to worship back in the Sanctuary. Yet, there may still be a feeling of loss and longing for normal. It's hard not being able to have the ritual of the music being sung by our choir, not being able to speak the Lord's Prayer in unison, not being able to sit close together. It is okay for us to honor and share our grief.

The holidays have their own patterns and rituals. At SHPC some of those beloved rituals during the holidays are the Community Thanksgiving Service, Cantata Sunday, the Advent wreath, decorating the sanctuary with fresh greenery and wreaths, Lessons and Carols, and a candlelit Christmas Eve singing "Silent Night." We know for us this holiday season may feel different. Things are different. There is pain and loss in the new and different. Yet, I wonder, what are the rituals that we can hold onto even while other things may be different? What are new rituals that we can enact to bring meaning and hope, love and light to this season?

For me, I have hope and am excited about some old rituals transformed like Christmas games and crafts Dec. 6 at BLAST and Youth Small Groups. I am excited about an Outdoor Christmas Pageant possibility! A new ritual I am holding onto is telling the stories and singing the songs of our faith to Anders. While he cannot hear those songs booming from the choir loft—and oh how I grieve that, I can still sing to him the songs and tell him the stories of our faith while bathing him, playing, cooking dinner, and before bedtime. What rituals do you miss the most? What rituals do you turn to for strength and hope in these days? Share them with me if you have a moment by emailing or calling me!
