As we remember our "Great Cloud of Witnesses" in this anniversary year, may we be inspired by their example to move forward in faith, hope, and love. May we live, and give, and work together in service to Jesus Christ, **"the pioneer and perfecter of our faith."**

Campus Ministry

In 2015 our congregation reached out in faith to imagine a new possibility for a college campus ministry program at the University of South Alabama. Throughout previous years we had tried various models for



supporting this kind of outreach to students, but we found ourselves in a time of transition as an old model had come to an end. Through a combination of our own campus ministry funds, a large grant from the Presbytery of South Alabama, and support from other outside organizations, our Campus Ministry Committee created a new model for the program that included calling a parttime ordained minister, Rev. Lauren Peters, to serve as the Campus Minister for UKirk South Alabama.

Because of these outside donations and the tight nature of our church budget, the campus minister position was designed to be an "off-budget" position without impacting the SHPC annual budget. The position included the expectation of fundraising to develop support for a sustainable campus ministry program. The initial funding sources enabled us to guarantee that we could afford her salary for three years giving her time to develop this external fundraising base. Under Rev. Peter's leadership our church moved to expand our Campus Ministry Committee to become a larger and broader UKirk Board comprised of members and pastors of many other Presbyterian churches in our area. Also, the position of campus minister was expanded to take on more hours in order to have time to lead this board in their efforts to support the ministry while also giving sufficient time for programing and pastoral leadership matters with the students.

Over these past years, the UKirk ministry has grown to a program that reached dozens of students as a spiritual

home in this significantly formative time in their lives. Student leaders have served as officers and helped design and lead their programs, mission, study, and fellowship. Each winter, students have attended the Montreat College Conference, and a few even found their

way into our church family and joined SHPC. However, while this wonderful growth was occurring on campus, the outside support for the program was not forthcoming. The UKirk Board was able to raise some funds to extend support for this model of ministry, but not enough.

A grant from the PC(USA)'s 1001 New Worshiping Communities program was received as was a significant gift tithed from SHPC's Welcoming the Next Generation Capital Campaign. However, even with these few large donations, a stable fundraising base never developed among the churches of South Alabama. Thus, in the past few weeks, Rev. Peters and the UKirk Board came to the realization that there were simply not enough funds to support this model of that included the salary of an ordained minister.

The UKirk Board shared this news with the Presbytery at its fall meeting and our church Session was informed that same day. Rev. Peters has worked faithfully through this time of transition to ensure that while the current model of ministry comes to a close the students in the program are still enabled to continue with UKirk as a viable student organization. So, while we are sad to say goodbye to Rev. Peters in this capacity, we give thanks for the rebirth of the campus ministry program that she led, and we will continue to support the students as they take this ministry into its next chapter.

Learn to Help "All Creatures, Great and Small"

A RedRover Responders Volunteer Training Workshop will be offered on Saturday morning, **October 19th from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM in our Fellowship Hall.** This training is open to all community members who would like an opportunity to volunteer and assist animals in crisis. RedRover, a 501c3, helps animals rescued from disasters or neglect, domestic violence victims seeking safety with their pets, and animals with life-threatening illnesses.

The RedRover Responders volunteer corps are the backbone of efforts to provide lifesaving care and sheltering for animal victims of natural disasters, puppy mills, hoarding, and other cases of cruelty and neglect. RedRover welcomes volunteers at all levels of experience, from a casual pet-lover to an experienced rescuer or animal care professional.

The training program consists of attending a four hour in-person workshop and completing IS-100c, an online FEMA class.

The workshop registration fee of \$45 includes a volunteer handbook, the volunteer t-shirt and certificate of completion that are mailed to you after attending the in-person volunteer workshop.
