The combination of a sweet fizzy drink with hot, salty popcorn is a temptation I can't resist.

What other temptations can I not resist? I think I am pretty good at setting the cruise control on my car when I start the drive to Birmingham. It's set at the speed limit. My favorite stop on that drive is at the Evergreen Conecuh store. I have to have a smoked sausage hot dog with mustard and relish. That's the way the hot dogs were served at the community pool when I was a teenager. That's still my favorite way to enjoy any type of meat in a long bun. I dress my hamburgers differently.

When I get back in my car to continue the trip to Birmingham (and this also works on the return trip to Mobile) it seems that I am then less patient. I no longer use the cruise control and I exceed the speed limit. I don't need to be in a hurry. I don't have a deadline for my arrival. I am looking forward to seeing Sally, but I know she will be at home when I arrive. I'm not anxious. What is it? Why do I give in to the temptation to drive faster? If I think that while I am on the interstate, I slow down. Maybe I am temporarily tempted. Maybe I am briefly tempted and then regain my sense of direction. I can stay below the speed limit. I can stay on the path. I can follow the light. I can live a disciplined life. At least, sometimes.

But please, don't take away my popcorn in the theater.

Hello, SHPC family! Stewardship season is all year round.

Dedication Sunday is October 15. On this day, in response to God's Word, we will together present our *financial pledge cards and a time and talent survey* as tangible representations of our commitment to Christ's service. You don't have to wait until Dedication Sunday though to submit these items, please call or email the church office or use the website to respond for next year's planning. *The Stewardship Committee cannot emphasize enough how important these written commitments are to the life of the church*.

The financial pledge cards inform our Budget and Finance Committee for next year's educational programming, missions, and regular expenditures. The budget preparation for the next calendar year begins in November to be finalized no later than January. If financial pledge cards aren't submitted in October, we are unable to fully plan for the next calendar year. While we are extremely appreciative of non-pledged giving, non-pledged giving makes it very difficult to budget and plan for our future. Additionally, we all are aware that costs are higher now than in years prior. SHPC is not immune to these rising costs. Committee chairs and staff are thoughtfully planning the work of the congregation while monitoring the funds they use to do so, but we need more to ensure our future. The flip side to this is that if we can receive the financial pledges, we can budget not only for next year and our future, but we have potential to grow areas of mission and ministry that we all value.

The time and talent survey show how you want to be involved! If you have ever thought to yourself, "Why do I keep seeing the same people repeatedly doing the same things at the church?! I wouldn't mind helping sometimes, why doesn't anyone ever ask me?" It's because we didn't know you had an interest or talent you'd like to share! If you have an interest in being a Liturgist, Committee work, serve as a small group leader, sending cards, preparing food bags for children in need, or any other

interest, the time and talent survey will help to connect you into the life and mission of the church to serve the greater community.

We ask that you please prayerfully consider what you are called to do with your resources in the coming year and submit your financial pledge cards and a time and talent survey as soon as possible. Thank you so much for all that you do in the life of our church to help one another as well as extend God's love out into our community.




