JOURNEYING TOGETHER

DEAR SPRING HILL PRESBYTERIAN FAMILY, n this month of September we will set sail into an exciting series of worship services for the Fall. "Journeying Together" will be our theme as we recall the life-long journey of discipleship that Jesus calls us to embark upon. We'll also remember others in the community of faith of who are called to sojourn with us-Christianity isn't a solo endeavor! We need each other to get to the place that God is calling us to go. The guiding metaphor for this theme is image of a boat-which was used by ancient Christians to symbolize the church. Many important moments in scripture (from Noah and the Ark, Jonah's running away, Jesus calling the disciples, calming the storm, and walking on water) all feature boats as the prominent location for the

community of faith. We'll examine these stories and more in our sermons during this season.

Another story that we'll explore is when Jesus instructs the disciples, who are fishing on a boat, to cast their nets "on the other side." The result is an abundant catch of fish so large that they can barely haul it in. Taking risks by trying something new is hard. It's unfamiliar, fraught with fear of failure. Such risks may not produce the results that we've come to expect. Yet Jesus calls us, time and time again, to cast our nets "on the other side." This year our Stewardship Committee is

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Verbalize your Truth. God Listens.

Dear Friends,

How are you? Really? Often, we ask the question, "How are you?" as a way of greeting, a quick check-in. The standard responses I give and almost always hear are, "Fine" or "Busy." As a society, we often do not truly stop and pause to really say, how we are truly doing. Feelings are often buried. We pile up things in our lives to avoid discovering how we actually feel. We look at our phones instead of within ourselves to check in. Often, I think we do this because we are afraid of what we might find. We are afraid of the anger, hurt, sadness, grief, shame that we might have to confront. And there is a pressure to be happy—for our outside appearance to look bright and shiny.

Yet, all of this emotional burying does not really work. Emotions have a way of creeping back up when we do not want them to. The Tahitians have one of the highest suicide rates in the world, and researchers wondered why. A researcher, Robert Levy went and observed the Tahitian culture, and found that they did not have a word for sadness. Because of this, their sadness was never verbalized. Neither did they have a ritual or practice to share their sorrow. It makes me wonder, if rising rates of depression, suicide, and anxiety in our country could be linked in part because we struggle with ways to verbalize and share our pain with others. We need to lament, to share our suffering, and we struggle with where to turn.

Luckily, our Scriptures are full of places to turn when our words do not suffice, when we need to express our loss, pain, and sorrow. In the Old Testament Theology class I took this summer (which you are probably tired of hearing of), we focused on the Candor of the Psalms. The Psalms, the prayer book and the hymn book of our Scripture, are not just full of praise but lament too. Words like Psalm 88: "O Lord, God of my salvation, when, at night, I cry out in your presence, let my prayer come before you; incline your ear to my cry. For my soul is full of troubles, and my life draws near to Sheol. I am counted among those who go down to the Pit; I am like those who have no help, like those forsaken among the dead, like the slain that lie in the grave, like those whom you remember no more, for they are cut off from your hand. You have put me in the depths of the Pit, in the regions dark and deep. Your wrath lies heavy upon me, and you overwhelm me with all your waves."

This psalm, Psalm 88 does not end in hope. There is not resolution to the psalmists' lament. Sometimes, we too are in the middle of our pain where there is not resolution. But God can handle our pain, our lament. Our tough words are okay even when the resolution seems impossible.

I wonder if equipping ourselves with the language and prayers of lament found in the Psalms, could help us verbalize the suffering in their souls. Maybe it would help us all not to stifle our voices and the voices around us, but lift our suffering, the world's suffering to God. A huge need in our world right now, is not to fake happiness, but to reach out to one another, to voice our internal realities. This language of lament has the power to save lives. It also adds dimension to our God, who is big enough to handle our rawest emotions. Praying these Psalms might help us become a church that doesn't speak half-truths but is open to cry out and reaches out to the suffering in our world. It might help us become a church that is present—and doesn't move so quickly to resurrection (or Sunday).

So, may you open up your Bibles to see the laments of those who come before us and lift up your own laments and sorrows to God. Share your struggles. You are not alone.

THE HEIFER PROJECT CHALLENGE

As we approach the Christmas season, please read the following beautiful letter written anonymously by one of our church members. This letter tells how one family handles gifts to the Heifer Project.

THE MOST IMPORTANT CATALOGUE IN THE WORLD

How many of you get Christmas catalogues in the mail? How many of you get more Christmas catalogues in the mail than you would ever care to receive? This is to introduce you to one which will not come to you – you will have to make an effort to get it; yet, it is the most important gift catalogue in the world.

During the Spanish Civil War in 1936-1939, Dan West worked in the front lines as an aid worker. From this vantage point he saw, first hand, the devastating effects of that conflict in the forms of hunger and lack of clothing. So it was that he founded Heifer International in 1944. His vision, which has now become reality, was that, instead of providing food to the hungry and clothing to those in need of it, a methodology which would give them the requisite animals, education and training necessary to provide food and clothing for them and others would enable that methodology to produce an unending stream of renewable resources.

God has graced our family with an abundance of material gifts. Because of this, my wife and I have used the Christmas Season to teach the younger generation what is truly necessary and important and how one's priorities should be ordered. In this regard, my wife and I have chosen to take the funds which would otherwise go toward gifts for each individual family member and use those funds to make a donation to Heifer International. Every year on Christmas Eve a card is passed around the dinner table so that everyone, most importantly, the children, can learn specifically what composite gift, given in each of their names, has been given to those most in need. In this way, hopefully, a blessed tradition of giving will be perpetuated.

Backpack Food for Kids



Backpack Food for Kids Ministry is a local partnership between Spring Hill Presbyterian Church, Phillips Prep and Austin Elementary. Our goal is to provide nutritious, easy-toprepare weekend food for selected students.

Teachers and school staff identify students whose behaviors suggest they suffer from chronic hunger. On Friday,

these students discretely receive a bag of food to tuck into their backpacks for the weekend. There are several ways you can help to make this program a success.

1. Drop off Foods. Suggested food items are on a list in the hallway and the food can be dropped off at any time in the barrel in the Bride's room.

2. Make a Financial Donation. If you wish to make a donation, make your check out to Spring Hill Presbyterian Church with a note that the check is for the Backpack Ministry and bring the check to the office or place it in the collection plate on Sunday.

3. Fill A Backpack. Join in on days when Backpacks are filled in the Bullard Building. It's fun!

The schools and students are very appreciative and grateful for the assistance we provide with the Backpack for Kids Ministry.

Now that summer's over, it is time to get together again and see what everyone has been working on (or not!) in this heat.

It will be good to see everyone again, and we urge anyone who can knit or purl to join us on Tuesday, September 25th in the Bullard Building. at 10:00 a.m. You don't have to be an expert (we wouldn't want to "needle" you) You could work on a full-size prayer shawl – or a pocket-size one, too. (There is a basket of those for the taking in the hallway behind the sanctuary, so check them out.) Since our inception in June of 2013, we have given out 76 prayer shawls to those in need of comfort in times of need. Many thanks to all those who have contributed their time and talent.



We are looking forward to returning to the usual routine for children's Sunday school. The pattern of combining all ages, 3 years old through Fifth grade, will continue this year. After everyone hears the same story, there will be a variety of activities for all levels of learning. We also rely on our older children to help the younger ones with activities.

On Rally day, September 9, we will meet in the sanctuary and then head to the Bullard building for a quick lesson. We will hear about God's promise to Abraham and Sarah. If time permits, we will build an alter and give thanks to God for his blessings.

The lesson for September 16 will be about God's blessings for Ishmael and Isaac. The children will learn that all families have problems, but God cares for us even when we feel alone.

On September 23, the story will be about Joseph and his dreams of being a king. We will discuss how these dreams made Joseph's brothers angry. The children will learn that God had a plan to turn this jealousy into something good.

To wrap up the month of September, the story will be of the exodus of the Hebrew people from Egypt. The class will talk about what they would take from their homes if they had to leave quickly. They will also discuss the long journey ahead for the Hebrews, but that God will be with them every step of the way.
